





Volodymyr Dubovyk is an Associate Professor, Department of International Relations and Director, Center for International Studies, Odesa I. I. Mechnikov National University (Ukraine). V. Dubovyk has conducted research at the Kennan Institute, Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars (1997, 2006-

2007), at the Center for International and Security Studies at the University of Maryland (2002), taught at the University of Washington (Seattle) in 2013 and at St. Edwards university/University of Texas (Austin) in 2016-17. Volodymyr has been a Fulbright Scholar twice. He is the co-author of "Ukraine and European Security" (Macmillan, 1999) and has published numerous articles on US-Ukraine relations, regional and international security, and Ukraine's foreign policy. Currently he is a Visiting Professor at the Tufts University. He is also a recipient of the emergency grant from the Kennan Institute (2022), non-resident fellowships from the George Washington University (2022-2023) and University of Toronto (2022-2023). Areas of expertise: Ukraine, Transatlantic Relations, U.S., Black Sea security, security studies.





Graeme P. Herd is a Professor of Transnational Security Studies in the RPA Department of the GCMC. His latest publications include: Understanding Russia's Strategic Behavior: Imperial Strategic Culture and Putin's Operational Code (London and New York, Routledge, 2022) and Russia's Global Reach: A Security and

Statecraft Assessment, ed. Graeme P. Herd (Garmisch-Partenkirchen: George C. Marshall European Center for Security Studies, 2021).



Eoin Micheál McNamara is a research fellow at the Finnish Institute of International Affairs (FIIA). He previously taught extensively in International Relations at the University of Tartu in Estonia between 2013 and 2020. His main research interests include: transatlantic relations; US grand strategy; NATO;

transformation of war; and security in northern and eastern Europe. He has published in the NATO Review, the Revue Militaire Suisse, the Defence Forces Review, Irish Studies in International Affairs and in edited volumes published by Routledge and Palgrave MacMillan, among other outlets. His television, radio and newspaper commentary on security, defence and international affairs has featured in Finland's main media publications including Helsingin Sanomat, Ilta-Sanomat, YLE, YLE Svenska, Kauppalehti, Aamulehti, Turun Sanomat and Huvudstabadet and globally with outlets such as BBC World, Al-Jazeera, Euronews, the South African Broadcasting Corporation (SABC), the Times of London, the New York Times, El Pais, the Irish Times and Ireland's national broadcaster Raidió Teilifís Éireann (RTÉ). He has previously been awarded visiting research fellowships at the Institute of International Relations (IIR) in Prague, Czech Republic (2019); at the Centre for War Studies (CWS), University of Southern Denmark (2020); and at FIIA (2021-22). David H. Sacko is a Professor of Political Science at the United States Air Force Academy. A broadly trained security studies expert specializing in a variety of methodological approaches, Dr. Sacko's research currently focuses on Russian and Central European security affairs. Since joining USAFA in June 2002, he

has been a Fulbright Scholar at the University of Warsaw in 2007, a Minerva Research Fellow 2015-16, 2019-2023, the National Security and International Relations Division Chief, and the Brent Scowcroft Professor of National Security Studies (2021-22). His book The Unipolar World: An Unbalanced Future (Palgrave Press, 2007) situates unipolarity in contemporary world politics scholarship while other publications include articles on war studies, international political economy, and human rights in International Studies Quarterly, Defence and Peace Economics, Comparative Technology Transfer and Technology, Nationalism and Ethnic Politics, Contemporary Security Policy, Conflict Management and Development, Journal of Political Science Education as well as chapters in several edited volumes and four Institute of National Security Studies (INSS) reports. His students and he have conducted research throughout Eastern and Central Europe. Dr. Sacko currently is Fulbright Scholar and Visiting Professor at Warsaw University's Center for Eastern Studies (SEW) while he is on sabbatical in Warsaw, Poland.





Marius Janukonis is the Director, Strategic Management and Analysis Department at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Lithuania.. He is the former deputy head of mission in Lithuanian Embassy in Belarus and the former ambassador of Lithuania to Ukraine (2015 – 2020) Over his years at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Marius Janukonis has headed its Europe Department and the Northern and Central Europe Department.





and Belarus on TVN 24, Polsat, TOK FM and Polish Radio in Poland. Author of four books on the events of Euromaidan and the war in Donbass in Ukraine and biographies of Vladimir Putin and Alexander Lukashenko. Author of analyses of the political market for think-tanks (e.g. Polish-Czech-Slovak Solidarity Foundation, Centre for International Relations in Warsaw, Political Capital Institute in Budapest and Carnegie Foundation). He is currently an independent expert on the political market and economy of Central and Eastern European countries. He is a consultant on Eastern markets and investments in Eastern markets. He is a member of the Polish-Ukrainian Chamber of Commerce and a consultant and collaborator of Polish and European companies operating in the area of trade and investment in Ukraine.





Daniel Szeligowski is the coordinator of the Eastern Europe Programme. His research interests focus on Ukrainian affairs: the political and economic situation of Ukraine, its foreign and security policy, prospects for post-war reconstruction, Polish-Ukrainian relations and issues of Ukraine's integration

into the European Union and NATO. He has twice authored studies on the implementation of the EU-Ukraine Association Agreement, commissioned by the Bureau of Analysis of the European Parliament (2020, 2022). He was also editor and co-author of the country report on Ukraine for the EU-LISTCO international research project on identifying EU foreign policy challenges (2019). He holds a PhD in political science and administration, economist and political scientist by training. He is a member of the editorial board of the scientific journal Strategic Panorama, published by the National Institute for Strategic Research in Kyiv.



Anna Maria Wierzbicka Professor at the Faculty of Architecture, Warsaw University of Technology. Architect. Head of research teams. Expert in the field of architecture and urban planning. Specialist in the field of sacred architecture, monumental architecture, and concerning multi-family housing for families and socially excluded people. Head of the Ukrainian Reconstruction Support Centre at the Faculty of Architecture, Warsaw University of Technology. Laureate of EU Grant - ProModSe – Standardisation of Refugee Settlements in Lviv. Leader of research groups in the field of modernization of multi-family buildings. Head of Specialisation – A3- Architecture of Technology and Structure - Context and Meaning-WAPW.



Ernest Wyciszkiewicz – PhD in political science, Director of the Mieroszewski Centre. Previously, Deputy Director of the Centre and Programme Coordinator for Energy Security, Climate Change and International Law at the Polish Institute of International Affairs. Author of numerous analytical studies,

expert opinions and articles on energy policy of the Russian Federation and the European Union, European Union-Russia relations, foreign policy of the Russian Federation and international climate negotiations, sanctions. Coauthor and editor of the books "Pipeline Geopolitics. Energy Interdependence and Interstate Relations in the Post-Soviet Area' and 'Energy Security and Climate Change: Double Challenge for Policymakers'. Member of the editorial board of AREI - Journal for Central and Easter European History and Politics and Polish Diplomatic Review in "post-Soviet area" and "Energy Security and Climate Change: Double Challenge for Policymakers".



Marek Ziółkowski started his diplomatic career in 1991 in Belarus. After in 1992 the Embassy of the Republic of Poland in Minsk was officially established was appointed Deputy Head of Mission – till 1996. After completing his mission in Belarus, he served for several years in the MFA as Director of Department

of Eastern Europe at the MFA. In May 2001 he was appointed ambassador of the Republic of Poland in Kyiv, where he served until 2005. This period in bilateral relations with Ukraine was marked by a significant dynamic of the Polish-Ukrainian strategic partnership, the vitality of dialogue on national reconciliation and the support of Polish society for Ukrainians during the Orange Revolution. After returning to the headquarters of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, he expanded his competences in the field of multilateral diplomacy, in the years 2006-2008 as deputy director of the Department of Security Policy, and as director of the Department of Development Cooperation in 2008-2011, undertaking work on the draft law on development cooperation. In August 2012 he started his duty as the Ambassador of Poland to Nairobi. 2016-2017 he was undersecretary of State for eastern and security policies. 2017 – 2019 he served as Polish Permanent Representative to NATO. He participated in several trainings and courses in the field of security policy and EU issues. Retired -2021, main area of interest – climate security. Lecturer of Polish foreign policy and climate policy at Bialystok University and Collegium Civitas (Warsaw). He is author of numerous publications regarding Belarussian and Ukrainian minorities in Poland and Polish foreign policy.
